

teer every year and always have a good time.



I will try and find out so if you are interested in either contact Bob, he is also putting together the list for the treadle hammer workshop and I haven't heard how many people he has on the list.



Anvil Bridge

With the help of Louie Fisher, who works in my shop one afternoon a week, I recently made a tool for which I have felt a need for some time.


The forging of hinges and other scrollwork with chisel-split branches has always been difficult. Using the edge of the anvil has meant spreading the split members ninety degrees apart for dressing, then working them back together at the desired angle. Working over a tinsmith's hatchet stake held horizontally in the vise always involved a lot of repositioning the stake after hammering.

We began with a piece of leaf spring three inches wide and a half-inch thick.

- 1. Using a set hammer over the edge of the anvil, we created shoulders establishing the top of the tenon.
- 2. The remainder of the tenon was forged to the depth of the shoulder,
- 3. This was repeated several times until the width of the tenon had decreased to an inch and the thickness increased to an inch. Some upsetting can be done if the thickness does not increase enough. Longitudinal folds do not compromise the strength of the tenon.
- 4. With the tenon fit to the hardy hole, the material was cut to a convenient length and the shoulders upset to seat well on the anvil face.




An anvil bridge provides the acutely angled edge backed up by the mass of the anvil. I designed mine to have one edge beveled like the hatchet stake, one square edge, and a small spur with a longer taper. I considered making the spur a small square horn but thought that the thinner edge might be handier when this tool was in use.

- 5. The next step was to forge a right angle bend, toward the horn, about 2 1/2" above the anvil surface.
- 6. I marked a spot 2 1/2" from the far end and chisel cut the spur away from the side which would not be beveled. The spur was short, leaving a full width at the end for the foot.
- 7. A second right angle bend was then formed, leaving the spur material in the same plane as the bridge top. The foot was then upset or drawn out to create a level bridge top and solid contact for the foot.
- 8. A cross pein hammer was used to draw our the edge of the bridge with as little gain as possible in length. A curve in the bridge top resulting from stretching of the beveled edge can be corrected by upsetting the beveled edge from the ends or drawing out the opposite edge.
- 9. When the heavier forging was all done and the bridge was adjusted to sit solidly once again on the anvil face, the curved end of the spur was cut and it was forged to the desired taper. The bridge was not hardened or tempered.



Hauling Welding Cylinders?

Has this ever happened to you?


You run out of gas in the middle of a job and decide to go the welding supply to get your cylinder filled. You load it in the truck and tie it in as best you can. About the second corner you hear "clunk, clunk, BAM" and feel

the truck take a 6" sideways hop—the result of the cylinder coming loose from its bindings.

This solution requires a piece of scrap tube or bar '20" -40" long and a tie down strap. Of course it works best if you have a non-slip rubber mat in the bed of your truck.





Shop Tip, Drilling holes in a handle. By Bob Ehrenberger

I hate it when I try to drill through a handle and I don't get it exactly in the center, or when I have to drill half way from each end and the two holes don't meet up.


I got this idea from an old Bill Moran knife making video. He uses it to drill through irregular handles like a curved piece of




the center of the handle. Or at least it will line up the two center punches in the handle so the hole goes where you want.

I clamp my jig to my table because it isn't slotted for a vice. If you have a slotted table or a drill press vice you can use them to hold your bottom point in position.

Never have an off center handle again.

This discussion will be led by Kate Dinneen and the Van Go artists. • Next Terrence and Peter will lead a discussion on the design of gates, various options, concepts. Then a bit on the design process and all the questions involved including the practical-how tall? how wide?-and the more esoteric-what do we want it to say about the place? • Finally participants will be asked to draw thumbnail sketches based on everything they have learned from the site visit and the discussions.

Sun Oct 10:

• Finish up drawings, pin them all up and discuss them, asking individuals to talk about their drawings. The plan is to come up with a group consensus for a design which we will all feel happy about, which is exciting, stunning and attainable. Peter will take the ideas and draw up a working design for PART 2 of the DESIGN/BUILD WORKSHOP which will take place in May of 2011, once the funding comes in!

This event is hosted by the Black Jack Battlefield Trust, Hot Flash Metalwork and Walt Hull Ironwork.

Well friends, we made it. After 4 years, ABANA held a conference and it was a very successful one. There are always things to learn; there are always things to do better. But it is now clear that we accomplished what we set out to do – hold a conference focused on education and the basic elements of the craft without a lot of fluff or unnecessary expenditure. We had over 900 folks at the conference including about 250 family members.

I am happy to report that we cleared over \$90K from the conference including the auction plus about \$10K from Iron in the Hat. Thanks to all who participated and particularly to those affiliate groups who helped us with seed money and the talented artists and craftsmen who donated items to the auction

Of course the next question that naturally comes up is "what are you going to do with all that money?" Let me assure you that the Board will be very careful to use it wisely. And the first thing we will do is to save enough for seed money for the 2012 conference in Rapid City. Second, we plan to make selective upgrades to the equipment and tools we have to put on conferences. Other projects of a strategic nature are being defined.

The Iron in the Hat net proceeds will go exclusively toward our scholarships and grants programs. By the way, we are in the midst of re-working the Educational Trust governing documents to bring them into compliance with recent changes in the laws of Georgia that apply to such trusts. Once that is done we will look into updating the guidelines and limits for these programs.

In other news, we welcome Bill Clemens to the

board. Bill was very helpful in the operation of the gallery at the conference. Bill is also a recipient of ABANA's Joe Humble award for Affiliate Newsletter Editors. Bill will serve the remainder of Steve Williamson's term. We also thank Steve for his service, specifically for coordinating the gallery submission process.

Elsewhere in this issue you will find lots of conference coverage including images of exciting new work. Some of these artists were not on the scene at all when we had our last conference. This is great because it demonstrates the continuing vitality of our craft.

Please participate in the election of members of the board that is included within the pages of this Anvil's Ring. It is vitally important that the members take part in this important process. The Board sets the strategy for ABANA and carries out many of its programs. If you don't vote you don't get to complain.

Finally I have to urge you to renew your memberships and to urge your friends to join as well. The day-to-day operation of the organization depends on dues revenue not conference proceeds. The Board has held the line on the dues we charge but that can continue only if we can recruit more members. Please help spread the word.


